Elsworth School

We are the eco-Council from Elsworth Primary School. We are made up of 11 children and we range in ages

from 4-11 years old. We also have a Governor from the school who meets with us every week. Our aim for the year is to improve the local environment of both our school and the wider community and in the process earn a Green Flag for our school from Eco-Schools. We spent the Autumn term reviewing the environment and then producing an action plan to help us decide what to do first.

The three areas we plan to work on is Waste, Litter and Biodiversity. We hope to reduce the waste water, energy and rubbish that our school produces. We aim to have a litter free school and, with help from the village, clean up the litter around the area too. We hope to build enough animal houses and create enough places for creatures to find food around our school grounds so that we improve the range of animals, birds and insects which

A Winter Wonderland at Elsworth Pre-School!

The cold winter snap has given Pre-School a magical setting to inspire our children with the beauty of nature providing all the awe and wonder needed. The children have been exploring the physical properties of frost; from the way it crunches under foot to the extra detail that can be seen through a magnifying glass.

Ice has given us the opportunity for scientific experiments. To predict and conclude as we go, the children have investigated the fastest way to melt ice... cold water, warm water, salt or sunshine? You could have a go with your young child at home too! The experiment that has brought the most excitement has been how to break the ice the fastest... of all of the methods used, the children found that the hammers were the best tool for the job. As well as experimenting they have been learning how to use real tools safely and respectfully.

At Forest School we have been developing our gross motor skills by throwing different naturally found objects onto the frozen pond to see what would go the furthest and if anything could crack the ice. A favourite game at the



moment has been Foxes and Rabbits, inspired by developing a connection to nature but also the children's love of Peter Rabbit and Mr Tod.

The Pre-School team



have been creating inspiring activities to ignite a love of literacy in our young children and this term's book choices have been a hit. We have been on spectacular Bear Hunts, made animal tracks from The Gruffalo's Child and now we are exploring The Great Race and the origins

on The Chinese Zodiac through play, we can't wait for our next book!

'A Time for Reconciliation'

What I write here can apply, I believe, to seemingly small and apparently insignificant scenarios as much as national or global situations. Where the cap fits, wear it!

War in Ukraine continues. The standing of national politicians is probably at an all-time low. The numbers of 2-income households having to turn to foodbanks is rising rapidly. The deep dysfunction within the Royal Family is a sorry reminder of how far and wide is the need for a period in which reconciliation is allowed to take place, flourish and be transformative.

I am not expert in the detail that underlies the issues in these and many similar situations; but I do know Christians have a distinctive understanding of what is required to bring reconciliation. One of the momentous achievements of Nelson Mandela, after he became President, was setting up the Truth and Reconciliation Commission in 1996 to address the ills carried out in South Africa in the name of apartheid. Its' very title reminds us, any effective reconciliation is prefaced by the victims or aggrieved parties being able to be heard about the wrongs done. The influence of a Christian worldview was provided by the Chairmanship of Archbishop Desmond Tutu; his task was to allow truth to be told rather than the desire for vengeance to spiral or prevail.

There are a number of essential ingredients in any private or public process of reconciliation. Aggrieved parties need to be able to say how behaviour that has impacted negatively has felt and what it has done. Villains of the piece must own and acknowledge their wrongdoing. Forgiveness has to be extended by the aggrieved party to the other.

The wrongdoer has to change his or her attitude and behaviour to such an extent that what went wrong previously can't happen again. These steps indicate why such things take time; because of the complexity of the issues involved often and the depth of the intrusion wrongdoing has made on the composure and well-being of victims. Equally, all of the steps need to be coordinated or brought together.

The role of reconciler is rarely one that will attract recognition and plaudits; because it is about serving the needs of others and in such a way that pain and brokenness can be ameliorated and transformed and those previously at odds (rather than those facilitating reconciliation) can be celebrated for laying down their divisions and hostility.

My prayer for the coming months is for gifts of reconciliation to prosper and the weeds of hostility to be overcome and wither.

We have set out to solve the main problems the current old-fashioned system has. In particular; the frustrating waits on hold for the phone to be answered, not seeing the same doctor every time, difficulties accessing appointments for people who cannot wait on the telephone and the worry of "how do I get help today when all the appointments have been booked?".

We have visited other practices who use other systems and we are pleased to inform you that from the 1st March we will be moving to a system called AccuRx. AccuRx will be available via a link on our website, and all of our patients will need to use this system if they wish to request an appointment with a doctor. You can use AccuRx to send a short summary of your symptoms and concerns to us. It should only take a few minutes to complete the form.

Every request will be triaged by a doctor on that day. The doctor could send you advice, call you, direct you to another service such as a physiotherapy, arrange some diagnostic tests, ask reception to book you an appointment today/ tomorrow/fortnight depending on urgency or an appointment with a particular doctor who knows you.

Our patients who do not have access to the internet or are unable to complete the AccuRx online form themselves are still welcome to telephone us. Our receptionists will be trained to complete the form on your behalf, but they will not be able to book you an appointment until the request has been triaged by a doctor.

There may be times when we have to pause use of AccuRx, for example, if we have staff sickness or there is very high demand for appointments. In these cases, which we expect to be infrequent, patients can still call us if they have a medical emergency, but anything else we would ask to wait for the next working day at 7 a.m. when AccuRx switches back on again.

Our aim is to improve patient safety and quality of care. We want you to be able to see the right clinician, in the right time frame and avoid duplication of work! We also hope that by having a doctor triaging requests instead of the reception team, our patients will feel more confident that a doctor is aware of your symptoms and that we will make a plan with you. There is very positive feedback from other GP practices who use this system. Dr Cronk has recently been working at a local practice who use AccuRx, and reports that it works really well.

For now, while we are trailing the new system it is for doctors' appointments only and all other appointment requests (such as routine nursing appointments, physiotherapy, blood tests, reviews of long-term health conditions/medications etc.) can be requested using the old system via the telephone.

We will have more information on our website soon.

Things To Do Around Elsworth...


This will be an ongoing column which we will use when there is space in the magazine. If you have visited anywhere special (especially places that might be 'under the radar') then do let us know and we can share it.

There is so much history in our part of Cambridgeshire and visiting an indoor attraction would seem appropriate for our current weather!

One of our most famous 'sons' is Oliver Cromwell (love him or loathe him!) and two excellent places to learn more about him are...

1. The Cromwell Museum in Huntingdon

This tiny treasure boasts over eight hundred items pertaining to Cromwell's life and times and claims to have the best collection on public display in the world. It has portraits, clothing, weaponry, armour – and even his hat!



The museum is housed in the former Huntingdon Grammar School, which Cromwell attended (as did Samuel Pepys). The building itself is the only remaining remnant of a medieval hospital, built to serve travellers and pilgrims in the 12th Century.

Exhibits portray his early life and military career prior to his life in politics and often has special temporary exhibits. It offers tours and activities for groups and schools. The friendly volunteers are very welcoming and knowledgeable. Open Tuesday - Saturday 11am - 3.30pm (1 November - 31

2. Cromwell's House in Ely

For a more intimate glimpse into Cromwell's political life, a visit to Cromwell's house in Ely is an absolute must.

Entering the house through the gift shop, you can collect a personal audio guide which moves you through the house, room by room, at your own pace.

This is an excellent attraction for both adults and children. There are plenty of activities for younger visitors to engage with – including some period dress-up clothing and toys – as well as a wealth of historical information for older children and adults.

This venue also offers events such as Escape Rooms for families and groups. Can your groups solve the mystery surrounding the disappearance of Curator Chadwick using the clues set in Cromwell's 17th Century Tithe Room? Or how about a team building event with 4 teams battling to solve the mysteries contained in four rooms of the house. Maybe a Murder Mystery Evening would tempt you? All Available for booking!

A function room is also available for meetings and functions in an atmospheric surrounding.

Recipe Exchange

Please send us your favorite recipes to share – the one you know will always work!

MOROCCAN CHICKEN

I have made this recipe multiple times and each time have received compliments. The unusual combination of ingredients makes it a bit exotic. You can also add dried dates or apricots if you're feeling especially adventurous.

2 Tbsp olive oil

8 chicken breast filets

1 onion, chopped

1 garlic clove, chopped

1 lemon, chopped

1 lemon thinly sliced

1 can chopped tomatoes

1 chicken stock cube 1 Tbsp honey

2 Tbsp Moroccan spice mix (Rash El Hanout)

Black olives

1/2 pomegranate, seeds only

Mint leaves

1 Can lentils and 1 to 2 cans chick peas

Red wine

1 Tbsp of olive oil

Cook the seasoned (with salt and pepper) chicken pieces on both sides (about 15 minutes). Remove the chicken to a plate.

Add remaining oil and onion to the pan - stir and cook until the onion is transparent. Add the garlic and Moroccan spice. Cook until the spices smell fragrant. Add chopped lemon, tomatoes, stock cube, honey and wine.

Bring to a boil, place in a large oven dish mixing with the lentils and chick peas, add the chicken on top with a bit of the mixture to flavour. Cover with a lid or foil and cook in the oven for 1 hour.

Uncover, place olives and lemon slices on top and drizzle the lemons with a little oil. Return to the oven for 20 minutes or until the sauce has reduced a little. Add honey, salt and lemon to taste. Scatter with pomegranate seeds and mint before serving.

Spring is coming!

Elsworth is already showing signs of spring in the gardens and lanes – look out for snowdrops, early daffodils, and primroses as well as winter flowering plants and shrubs such as Hellebores, Dogwoods, Viburnam x bodnantense (Arrowwood), Chimonanthus praecox (Wintersweet) and Sarcococca (Sweet or Christmas Box).

We are very lucky in Cambridgeshire as there are lots of beautiful gardens and parks where winter planting and spring bulbs can be seen and enjoyed. Highly recommended are Anglesey Abbey, Cambridge University Botanical Gardens, Chippenham Park Gardens, Fullers Mill, Suffolk, Audley End, Wimpole Hall, Marks Hall Gardens and Arboretum in Essex, or Benington Lordship near Stevenage.

PARISH CLERK

Our Parish Clerk, Liz Sim, is on her way 'Down Under' to meet family and friends for the first time in several years and so missed January's Parish Council meeting. The following is a brief summary of some of the matters considered at 'highlights' from the meeting.

FLOODING

At its meeting the Parish Council considered a draft Community Flood Plan. A lot of hard work been put into this already, principally by Peter Ward who is a member of the Community Flood Group, but more remains to be done, including striking a balance between those things which the Parish Council undertakes and measures which residents could be expected to take to protect their own property or for which they have riparian obligations. A small steering group, will carry on detailed work on the plan, while the Flood Group has been 'adopted' by the Parish Council as a working group. As progress is made on flood prevention/relief, further reports will be made.

On related matters: it was agreed that the Sports Club's shed behind the pavilion is 'too far gone' to be repaired and that a new shed should be bought to replace it for the storage of equipment; the steering group will make proposals a.s.a.p. regarding the purchase of a small stock of sandbags and a flood warning trigger; for the forthcoming financial year (2023-2024), it was agreed to make a further provision for flood prevention/relief.

MAINTENANCE

Good news! As a result of James Howell's article in the last edition of the ET, a dozen volunteers have come forward to undertake identified maintenance tasks around the village.

KING CHARLES III'S CORONATION

A bring your own food and drink street party in Brook Street on Sunday, 7 May is being organised for everyone in the village. Look out for further details.

CHURCHYARD

The Parochial Church Council has given notice that it wishes the Parish Council to take responsibility for the maintenance of the closed burial ground in the churchyard by 1 January 2024. In turn the Parish Council agreed to pass this on to the District Council.

PRECEPT

It was agreed unanimously to keep the precept at its present level of £24k. We were informed that the District Council would be raising Council Tax by 3.4% to try to break even on its budget.



This particular wine is full of warm, sunny, brambly fruit with some slightly bitter chocolate tones and a gorgeous velvety texture. It is the perfect way to bring a bit of warm, sunny Italy to this rather cold and icy part of the year so why not grab a glass and join me in discovering this absolute gem of a wine".

Keep an eye out in the shop for more of Alex's monthly choices and, if you see him round and about the village, let him know what you think of them and tell him what kind of wine you'd like him to suggest in the future.
