Elsworth Great Potato Grow-off Results



Winner:- Paul Harding

Controversy surrounded the Elsworth Great Potato Grow-off weigh-in to establish the winners of this annual village challenge.

In the over 12 age category 31 potato bags were weighed with an average weight of 512 grams, slightly lower than the average weight in 2022 which

was 542 grams. The largest crop weighed came in at 1,823 grams. The heaviest single potato weighed 130 grams compared to a colossal 219 grams in 2022. The winner in both categories, which came as no surprise to anyone, was the estimable Paul Harding, who remained gracious but tight lipped when quizzed on his techniques, merely muttering something about the use of rain water. No one was fooled.

In the more important under 12 category, pre-tournament fears of another Ingham family rout of all opponents came to nothing as they were superseded by the Logan family. Edward Logan won the largest crop prize with potatoes weighing 685 grams. The largest single potato was grown by Fred Logan at 173 grams, significantly heavier than that in the over 12 category.



Judges on the committee for standards in potato growing were shocked to find one contestant had sought advantage by attaching additional plastic bagging to increase the growing bag volume. Current and future participants will be relieved to know this was identified before any weighing took place. This led (sadly) to the introduction of a new rule for 2024 (The Spirit of the Grow-off: which all participants must follow). However, the offence was deemed so heinous that we've applied the rule retrospectively. Disqualification was applied. You know who you are.

Congratulations to all 'clean' participants and we look forward to next year's mayhem.

PAPWORTH SURGERY

Mr G Stevenson attended a meeting as our patients' representative and raised the issue of patients' difficulty in booking appointments. The Surgery accepted that current arrangements for booking appointments were unsatisfactory and has subsequently initiated a new system for booking routine and emergency appointments.

FUNDING HELP FOR PRESCHOOL

The preschool needs to show that it has tried to raise funds locally in order to secure additional funding for renovations and new equipment. Cllrs agreed unanimously to support their funding efforts and proposed to make a financial contribution, estimated to be approximately £272.00. This is proportionate to the number of children attending the preschool who live in Elsworth Parish (38%). The preschool was encouraged to seek other possible sources of funding from Parishes where children are in Elsworth's catchment area.

SOUTH CAMBS DISTRICT COUNCIL MATTERS

- Bin collections. A trial of a 4-day week by Cambridge City Bins collection will start in October 2023.
- 4-Day working week for office staff. A government minister
 has ordered the trial of the office-based staff 4-day working
 week to cease with immediate effect. SCDC has responded
 with a letter requesting further information. 8-9 other councils
 are thinking of trialling the 4-day working week. PC members
 asked about feedback from residents regarding the 4-day
 working week and requested that the parishes be consulted to
 ascertain their opinions.
- Cambridge Congestion charge. The initial consultation was unsatisfactory and identified considerable objection to the proposals. Technical officers are going back to the drawing board to look at alternatives. A third draft of the proposals is likely. Parish Councillors and members of the public attending the July PC meeting raised concerns with the District Councillor regarding the proposals, in particular the fact that residents of South Cambridgeshire were being expected to subsidise the residents of Cambridge city's bus services. In addition, concerns were raised about the list of exceptions proposed, the need for a clear joined-up business case, the environmental implications and the knock-on effect of traffic chaos in Cambridge resulting from the way the city had dealt with the road system.
- Encouraging Young People. SCDC is endeavouring to engage more young people in its affairs. Cambourne Youth Club and the village college students have been involved and some students have spoken at D. Council meetings.
- Council Tax Collection. SCDC has an impressive collection rate for the council tax at 98.7% payment.

NEW PLANS FOR VIDEO CONTACT WITH POLICE.

The force is experimenting with video technology to permit on-site communication instead of sending a squad car to an incident. A recent spike in the number of ghost calls to 999 has been reported which may be because ambulance attendance time has recently increased.

TRAINING FOR CPR AND DEFIBRILLATOR

In response to an email asking for interest in training, thirty-eight village residents requested to attend a training session. This number presented issues. The defibrillator that is sited in the village by The Poacher was purchased from the East of England Ambulance Service and the package purchased included a free session of training, which the EAAS no longer offers. Training is

now only provided on a commercial basis and the cost for this number of participants would be prohibitive.

The Community First Responders NHS Trust (all volunteers) was contacted and this organisation can provide training free of charge. Elsworth School Head Teacher has agreed to the use of the hall for the session and a date in September was agreed to avoid school holidays. The session is now confirmed for Thursday September 28th 2023 at 6:30 – 8:30pm.

Parish Council members noted that no charge is made by Community First Responders NHS Trust for this training but that donations would be very welcome to enable the organisation to purchase equipment for their training sessions and provide the first response service. They agreed unanimously to give £100.00 donation to the organisation and it is hoped that participants will also give a donation.

TREES AND HIGH WINDS



A self-set willow on the verge by the brook near the stile, which was leaning badly over the road into power wires subsequently fell into the road during the recent high winds. Many thanks to Justin Wilkins for dealing with it so quickly.

A very big branch on an ash tree on the sports field partly came away, reasonably near to the play equipment. Rob Askham cordoned it off and it finally fell and has been partly cut up, leaving the tree unbalanced. Paul Harding, the Village Tree Warden inspected both of these trees and has advised on the need for professional inspections and remedial works on trees, which are necessary for Health and Safety purposes.

PUBLICATIONS

The PC reiterated its support for the Elsworth Chronical web site to be continued and documents archived. A project to look into the future of the Elsworth Times Newsletter is being led by Richard Hyde with discussions with the current editorial team.

VILLAGE MAINTENANCE

Maintenance requirements for the village are an ongoing matter. Members agreed to reinstate the PC's Maintenance Working Party and to authorise payment for much needed painting and other necessary maintenance to be carried out. James Witherow offered to deal with cutting back the lower sides of the brook in Brook Street which are not within the reach of verge cutting machinery.

PLAY EQUIPMENT

Various maintenance requirements have been identified during routine inspections. Vegetation at the entrance to the area from Broad End is scheduled to be cut back. The rubber matting surface is lifting in places and needs attention. The company that supplied this has been asked to inspect.

The large slide needs repainting but the best way to do this is unclear. The newly installed picnic tables are being well use and seem to be much appreciated.

Councillors agreed to request that the annual safety inspections should be carried out by the Play Inspection Company which had previously undertaken all annual inspections.

EWR. UPDATE

Many of you probably attended the recent EWR exhibition at the Belfry Hotel in Cambourne. The impact of the proposals on Elsworth would be considerable. EWR describe this as

"Transformational development opportunities": a term which many Elsworth Residents may take issue with. Peter Deer, The PC Chairman has explained more in an article in this publication. **Please read this.**

The story of a man waiting for a bus

Most people would be forgiven for taking just one quick glance at an elderly man waiting for a bus.

But thanks to one passerby in Soham, who saw the same man again a few hours later, extra steps have now been taken to safeguard him.

The kind woman initially noticed the man walking towards Ely earlier that same day, and then near the station a few hours later – looking very confused and disorientated.

The woman spoke to him, and the man in his 80s showed her his bus pass and said he was going to see someone but couldn't remember who.

He had no bag and declined a lift home from the woman, who then called us just after 3pm last Thursday.

We spoke to the man's family and checks revealed he had dementia. We put further safeguarding measures in place, including the Herbert Protocol.

Do you know about the Herbert Protocol? It's a scheme we support that can help find people with dementia should they go missing from home.

It encourages family and friends to keep a document that will help officers in the event a loved one goes missing by collating key pieces of information such as a physical description, familiar places, health details and an up-to-date photo.

Carers, family or friends of a vulnerable person, or the person themselves, can fill in a Herbert Protocol form in advance, containing information to help the police if the person goes missing.

Keeping a completed form means you don't have to try to remember the information when you are under stress if someone goes missing. And it saves time, so we can start the search sooner.

The East West Rail Route Announcement

In its recent Route Announcement, East West Rail (EWR) confirmed its plans for the Bedford to Cambridge section of the proposed rail line linking Oxford and Cambridge. The rail line would run from Bedford to Tempsford and then, as expected, would go north of the A428 until it reaches a station for Cambourne just south of Knapwell before re-crossing the 428 and making its way via Highfields Caldecote to Cambridge South station.

EWR envisages that locating a station for Cambourne north of the 428 will provide 'transformational' development opportunities, including housing for as many as 53,000 people near the station, for which seemingly no account has been taken in the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan. In 2021 the Parish Council saw plans produced by a developer to build up to 10,000 houses in the same area. These plans have not seen the light of day, but the boundary of the proposed development would have come to within about one mile of Elsworth. Housing for 53,000 people would require somewhere in the region of 27,000 new homes and development on this scale would therefore clearly pose an existential threat to villages like Elsworth and Knapwell. However, it is understood from our MP, Anthony Brown, that the Environment Agency is objecting to large scale developments in South Cambridgeshire that do not yet have full planning permission going ahead because of the dire water supply situation.

Although it is said that other options are being explored, at present it still seems that trains on the line will be diesel powered in the first instance. In the first half of 2024 there will be a statutory consultation on the preferred route and associated matters. In the meantime, as developments occur news of these is regularly posted on the Elsworth & District Facebook page where you can also make your own comments.



HOLY TRINITY CHURCH ELSWORTH



Finding Wisdom, when it's needed!

Summer has arrived. I've been to one Sports Day, an end of year school performance and begun to take stock of another year already beyond the half-way mark! Over the next few weeks, we are saying an unexpected thank you and farewell, after 14 years with the Papworth Team Ministry, to our colleague, The Revd Stephen Day. He is moving to The Three Rivers Group - taking charge of 5 parishes close to Soham, Ely and Newmarket. Meanwhile, the world seems to be getting more uncertain

and unnerving at the same time – more trouble in the Middle East between Arabs and Israelis, stories of armed attacks in normally safe environments to name but a couple from recent new bulletins I watched.

Remaining composed and yet alert to more possibilities than we can imagine seems to be an ever-present demand these days. During the summer term a school I visit regularly asked for contributions to Collective Worship (known as Assembly in times past) on the subject of wisdom, Offering insights young children can grasp from the Bible and the life of Jesus has reminded me much wisdom is seen in how we react to the things thrown at us or arising unexpectedly – making choices on the best information

available and with a view to their different outcomes. It strikes me that if our children need to learn how to be wise it is a life-long quest for all of us, especially in changing or uncertain times.

For me, remaining composed and alert to the unexpected means knowing how to get good counsel and make the best decisions. Family and friends can be very helpful, seeking advice from trusted colleagues, acquaintances and experts is clearly important. As a Christian I know I can also go to God and examine what the Bible says. This is where Christian input in a church school fits in as part of the whole learning experience. One of the challenges is knowing how to read and digest what the Bible says in an appropriate way. As one wise person put it 'a text taken out of context can easily become a pretext'. That is, taken to mean something it was never meant or intended to do. As such the answer to any dilemma will rarely be 'Just read the Bible and you will know what to do...' Because it is an ancient encyclopaedia of sacred texts through which Christians believe God speaks to us, it requires study to know what they were trying to say and how that translates to our 21st century world.

Just recently, from the options offered, I chose to preach from Genesis 24. It is an extended narrative of how Abraham sent a trusted servant to find a suitable spouse for his son Isaac. It is a story that offends western sensibilities for many, because it is an "arranged marriage". Nevertheless, it shows two people coming to love each other, establishing a home together and then being blessed by children. A point I made was about how the account began: it is not there to advocate arranged marriages but starts from a caring and concerned parent wanting to see his son and heir happily settled. This is a sentiment many will have and understand. The desired outcome is achieved when the trusted servant prays to God and finds his prayers answered. A primary lesson to me is remembering to call on God's help i.e. approaching him through prayer. We CAN find ways of navigating well through the inadequacies of the prevailing culture. We can find divine wisdom at such a time as this.

YOGHURT TART Recipe

Here is a great recipe I discovered pretty much by accident a few months ago. I have changed it a bit (it was presented as a cake without a base).

It is easy to make, low in fat and calories, and quite delicious.

1 pie shell (home made or purchased)

Sugar to taste (maybe 3 Tablespoons)

375 grams of vanilla yoghurt (I use Greek style)

Vanilla flavouring (1 teaspoon)

4 large eggs

5 Tablespoons of sifted corn flour

Preheat the oven to 175 C

Mix yoghurt, eggs (one at a time) and sugar and whisk together. Sift the cornflour into the batter and whisk until no lumps remain. Pour the batter into a large pie shell/crust.

Bake for 1 hour until mixture puffs up. Cool—then place in the fridge for at least 2 hours.

Remove from the fridge 15 minutes before serving. Serve with berries of choice and cream of choice.
