A Very Merry Christmas and a Happy 2024 to all parishioners

CHRISTMAS TREE

Once again, a big thank you to the owners of the Mill who are donating the Christmas tree to the village. The tree will be put up outside the community shop and the lights will be switched on, on Friday 15th December at 6pm. It is so good that residents can now get together to enjoy this social time. There will be mulled wine and mince pies to stave off the winter chill as well as sweetie treats for children . Don't miss this occasion – bring the whole family along – bring all your friends - to celebrate the season, meet other residents and generally enjoy a great get together.

SCDC 4 DAY WEEK

Ms Liz Watts CEO of SCDC attended the November PC meeting. She explained the rational of the 4 day week trial: that it was set up in response to a recruitment crisis, the inability of the DC to retain staff and the rising cost of employing temporary staff. Now, some eight months into the trial, she reported that data relating to these difficulties was positive; staff well-being had improved, in excess of £5k had been saved on agency staff, work patterns were more intensive and staff preferred working the 4 day week.

She acknowledged the government's intervention, that a best value notice had been issued with a request that the trial finish with immediate effect, but the DC is continuing the trial. The government has requested specific data relating to productivity and value for ratepayers.

Parish Councillors raised many points which MS Watts responded to. She informed councillors that a large-scale consultation is planned for January 2024 during which outside bodies, parish councils and ratepayers will be asked their opinions.

DEFIBRILLATOR AND CPR TRAINING SESSION.

The training/refresher session that was held in September was very well attended by residents. The Community First Response





team provided an informative and helpful session. However, the session highlighted the need for mobile phone contact for quick access to help. Several residents commented on the extremely poor mobile coverage in Elsworth and expressed concern that this might hamper their ability to access speedy assistance. Mobile phone coverage is poor in this village and it is hoped that this will soon be improved.

CCC LOCAL HIGHWAYS INITIATIVE

Councillors agreed unanimously to submit a proposal for funding for the installation of double yellow lines along stretches of Boxworth Road near junctions of Orchard Close, Roger's Close, Duncock Lane and the entrance to the George and Dragon pub. An alternative proposal to make pedestrian access to the Avenue Business Park safer by installing a pedestrian crossing over the existing traffic calming table at the junction of Broad End and a further footpath on Smith Street would be prohibitively expensive.

Did you know?

There is always more to people in the public eye than we are aware of. The funeral of the late Sir Bobby Charlton is taking place as I write this piece. He is rightly and widely acclaimed for his achievements as perhaps the greatest footballer to have represented England and Manchester United. What is less well-known is the laudable charitable work and interests he gave himself to in later life; also, who, again in later years, had

fallen out with two members of his own family. We all have our Achilles' heel; a point of weakness that can leave us and others vulnerable, unless exceptional care is taken to guard against the impact of such frailties.

An inability or unwillingness to forgive and be reconciled can be an example of what I mean.

These same sentiments manifest themselves in the global conflicts seen in the wars between Palestinian HAMAS and Israel as well as between Ukraine and Russia. In matters we understand very little about – particularly over strained relationships between people we hardly know – reconciliation requires both parties to a dispute to come together. I am responsible for doing all I can to mend something broken I am associated with, but I can't answer for the other party. Forgiveness is something different, whether our 'issues' are small or significant.

Without forgiveness we can't be reconciled and restored in relationships that have fallen into disrepair. Forgiveness is the gift of someone who has been hurt or offended, towards the perpetrator of wrongful behaviour. It is not dependent on whether forgiveness is received and embraced. Part of the challenge can be in knowing I may forgive someone and still the breach between us is not healed – because the other person is unwilling to see the relationship restored. It may be even more daunting when both parties are perpetrators of wrongs, and the only difference may be in the degrees of forgiveness needed on either side!

Christians ought to be top notch forgivers of others. This is because we believe we are beneficiaries of God's unconditional and unmerited forgiveness to us, expressed in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. This casts a new light on Christmas and preparing for a new year.

Christmas is when we celebrate the birth of Jesus who came to secure our forgiveness by God and to model what forgiveness and reconciliation looks like among us. Let's use this season to leave no stone unturned in choosing to forgive and making sure the other party knows they have been forgiven.

We may feel very gloomy right now about the prospects for peace in Ukraine and between Israel and HAMAS; also, whether our own 'issues' will ever be sorted. God sees them differently. He has not given up on us or on what can transpire in today's global conflicts. That's why He is described in the Bible as 'the God of hope', for whom nothing is impossible. The Prince of peace invites us to be peace-makers for our times and circumstances.

THE FESTIVAL OF CHANUKAH

Rabbi Dr Ruth I Fleischer Hanukah means "dedication" but is also called "the feast of lights". This 8 night celebration commemorates the rededication of the Jerusalem Temple in 168 BCE. During the eight nights of Hanukah, a



candle is lit on the "hanukiah" (the Hanukah menorah containing nine candles, the ninth of which is the "shamash" or "servant" by which the others are lit). Each night we meditate upon another aspect of the Hanukah story. . . .

The story of Hanukah properly begins with Alexander the Great whose empire extended from Greece to India. Two centuries after Alexander's conquest, Judea was ruled by the Syrian Seleucids, one of three divisions of Alexander's empire. Many Jews were attracted to Greek art and architecture, philosophy and athletics, and assimilated into the pagan scene.

In 175 BCE, after a mild revolt against the hellenisation of the Temple, quickly suppressed by King Antiochus "epiphanes" ("the exalted one", Antiochus resolved to crush Judaism and Jewish practices, demonstrating an antagonism and hatred for Judaism. Antiochus established a Greek city on the Temple mount and in 167, established a new ritual using a pig! All Jews were commanded to bow before Zeus and the other Greek gods. They were commanded to look, eat and behave like Greeks--or die!

When the new decrees of Antiochus were heard in the town of Modi'in, Mattitayu, a priest, destroyed the pagan altar. He, his wife, Chanah, and their 5 sons declared "though all Israel follow the king, we will follow God." The Jewish nation took up the battle, inspired by the cry, "who is for the Lord, come!"

When Mattityahu died his son, Yehudah became the leader. He was called "Maccabee", derived literally from "macab" which means "hammer", but also from the initial Hebrew letters of the verse: "who is like unto You among the mighty O Lord " (micha mocha b'elim Adonai).

Even when fearful Jews obeyed, they were often killed. Greek soldiers went from town to town throughout the land killing Jews and burning Torah scrolls. Death was pronounced upon any Jew who circumcised his son, kept the dietary laws, or read from the Torah.

Antiochus sent his army against the Jews on Shabbat, slaughtering men, women and children. But tragedy was turned to triumph, as a vibrant Jewish army arose, heathen altars were broken down, and Israel unitedly turned back to God. Biblical worship and practices were restored throughout the land.

Antiochus responded by amassing one of the largest armies ever to take the field in ancient times: 200,000 footmen, 12,000 horsemen, and 32 battle elephants! Yet Israel won a tremendous victory and the people rejoiced at God's deliverance.

When Jews entered the defiled Temple, their jubilation was overshadowed by the signs of hatred, pagan rites, and vandalism. The idol of Zeus was destroyed, and they began the monumental

task of cleansing the Temple. Then they searched for consecrated oil to light the golden menorah, as a sign that the Temple was renewed and rededicated to God. In their search, they found only enough oil to burn for one day.

Miraculously, the oil burned for 8 days--long enough to prepare more oil. This is the miracle of Hanukah which we celebrate, and why Hanukah lasts for eight days, beginning with the lighting of a single candle, until, on the 8th night, the glory has grown and all eight candles are ablaze at once. The verse from the Scriptures recited at Hanukah is: "Not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit, says the Lord." (Zechariah 4:1).

Victor lives in Rogers Close and has two sons in the forces.

The cross he is holding is for his father.


